Meditation: Compel Them to Come In

"And the lord said unto the servant,
Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in,
that My house may be filled."

Luke 14:23

"So that servant came, and showed his lord these things." Every servant is accountable to his lord, to bring a report of his work and success. Here the Lord Jesus sits at an earthly supper, but speaks of a spiritual and heavenly supper, to which were "bade many." No, not all were bidden, but we would say, there was a list of invited guests. This was a privilege of the Jews from antiquity, being set apart by the Lord as His favoured people. The preaching of the Old Testament Law and Gospel began with them, as well as in the New Testament time, when the disciples of the Lord were commanded to "go not into the way of the Gentiles... but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." So the Gospel message has gone out to them in warm invitations, to enjoy a "feast of fat things, a feast of wines on the lees, of fat things full of marrow, of wines on the lees well refined" (Is. 25:6). So the Word of the Lord descended to that people as to the Bride of Solomon, "I am come into My Garden, My sister, My spouse: I have gathered My myrrh with My spice; I have eaten My honeycomb with My honey; I have drunk My wine with My milk: Eat, O friends, drink, yea drink abundantly, O beloved" (SoS. 5:1). Is it not provoking that such friendly proposals are met with such empty and vain excuses as, "I have bought a piece of ground, and I must needs go and see it;" or "I have bought five yoke of oxen, and I go to prove them;" or "I have married a wife, and therefore I cannot come?" My friends, are we so different than the Jews? Have not those warm and friendly invitations been proposed to us since our youth, that we may take part in the richest blessings? But how many and how vain have been our excuses? Is it not true, that

by nature we simply have no desire? Would it be any wonder if the Lord would declare, also concerning us, that "none of those men which were bidden shall taste of My supper?"

But it cannot be that the Lord's guesthouse will be empty. If the invited guests will not come, He will bring in others. Where does He begin? "Go out quickly into the streets and lanes of the city, and bring in hither the poor, and the maimed, and the halt, and the blind." Thus, He still remains with Israel. If the rulers have no desire, He will invite the common people; those who were ordinarily forgotten, despised and neglected, those who were impotent, who needed to be led by the hand or carried into the great supper. He will bring in the poor, who could not provide for themselves, who were hungry, thirsty, naked and destitute. What a sight! What a contrast! Wealth and poverty, greatness and lowliness! And when these are brought in... "yet there is room!" Ah, the kingdom is so large there is no limit to the number of guests. It is an infinite expansion, nor is there a limit to the efficacy of the blood Jesus Christ, which is sufficient to cleanse the sin of the whole world. And because there is yet room, the invitation is further expanded; "Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in, that My house may be full." What are the "highways and hedges?" These refer to the Gentiles, who dwell outside of the city, who were called after the Jews rejected their King. These must be "compelled" to come in. Why? Oh, is it not for them a great wonder? These are outsiders. Did you ever become an outsider? These are they who were

not numbered among the Lord's favored people. They did not belong to His Kingdom. They do not know the way. But now they are being invited. Surely, they will say with the Centurion, "I am not worthy." Surely, they will swoon with Ruth the Moabitess, that the Lord has spoken "friendly unto thine handmaid, though I be not like unto one of Thine handmaidens." "Compel them to come in," who would otherwise not dare to approach because of their sin, their guilt, their pollution. "Compel them to come in," who otherwise would shrink from entering in to the great supper for fear, with Esther, that they are not called by the great King. "Compel them to come in," who will lay impotent at the feet of the King, saying, "What is Thy servant, that thou shouldest look upon such a dead dog as I am?"

My friends, did you ever experience your poverty, your impotence, your ignorance, your wickedness? Did you ever become a Gentile in your heart? That is necessary if you will be included in this command to

His servants, "Compel them to come in," for that is the people whom it concerns. There is yet room! His house is not yet full! Did the Lord ever reveal something of His dear Son to your soul, that you may know what grace and mercy are? This alone is able to give that holy boldness by which Abraham spoke unto the Lord, though he was but dust and ashes. This alone brought the Publican just inside the doors of the Lord's Temple, smiting upon his breast, saying, "God be merciful to me, a sinner." By this alone the woman of Canaan, a Gentile, a heathen, an outsider dared to approach, that she may receive one of the crumbs which the dogs eat, falling from the Master's table. "Compel them to come in," the poor, the maimed, the lame, the blind, the outsiders; all of whom cannot easily be convinced that such as they would be accepted. "Compel them to come in," that I may forgive them, that I may cast all their sins behind My back, that I may wash, may cleanse, may renew them unto Myself. "Compel them to come in... that My house may be full."

Mission Work During the Corona Crisis

South America was not so aware of what was unfolding in the world, when the news came about a new virus in China. We even had one of our parents from the Netherlands visiting us the first week of March. Unfortunately, they had to leave a couple days after arriving. It appeared they had the last flight out of Bolivia. This example describes how fast the circumstances were changing. Within a matter of days Bolivia was, and still is, in complete lock down.

The news from the different areas in the world, who were encountering many cases of Covid-19, frightened Bolivia. Our thoughts quickly turned to those who are living in the midst of this outbreak, also in our congregations in North America and the Netherlands. That the Lord may help them who are sick and provide comfort for the mourning. Yesterday we received the news that an elder of our congregation in the Netherlands also passed away. These are very serious times. However, the health service in countries like Bolivia cannot even meet the standards of the countries that have a hard time to control the various outbreaks. It is a calling to proud humans,

that we are dust. Science is not able to help, as many had thought it would. We are totally dependent upon the Lord for our health. That this serious calling may lead to true repentance and respect for the Lord and His ways.

Bolivia took very drastic measures. As a result, the amount of cases is presently relatively low. However, it has a huge cost for the economy and daily lives of the average person in Bolivia. Many people live by what they earn that same day. Because of the very strict lock down, they cannot make a living at all. And as their situation does not provide for savings, very soon they enter in severe

continue to keep teaching them from the scriptures. Also, in times like these we need to stand together as a congregation. It is important to gather around His Word, asking to be guided by the Word and the Spirit. It is our prayer that the Lord may use the simple means, so that people will also be edified spiritually in this period. However “Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you” also include to act as the Lord teaches in Matthew 25, “In as much as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my

poverty and even hunger. In the meantime, leaving the house is very restricted: only people between 18 and 65 years old, one day a week according to their identity card number, only between 7:00 am and 12:00 am, and only by foot or bicycle. This means that not only the economy for more than 80% is shut down in the whole country, but also schools and churches are completely and strictly closed. That has necessitated in a review regarding the approach of our work in our mission post during this time. No mission outreach as usual, no church services, no church activities during the week, no visits.

brethren, ye have done it unto me”. Together with the benevolent committee of our mission post, we decided to provide grocery bags for the families in desperate need. Due to the government restrictions, allowing only foot and bicycle traffic, it was very hard to do more deliveries than just the people that attend the church. However, Gal. 6:10 teaches us to do “good to all men”. It didn’t feel to be the right thing to only provide help to “them who are of the household of faith”. After two weeks of struggling to distribute food as benevolent committee, the Lord opened a way to be able to distribute more groceries

Still the great commission is: “Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen.” Therefore, we prayerfully seek for means to reach out to the people in this difficult time, so we can

with our car, by providing a contact with a Police Captain. This man allows us to use our vehicle to deliver the food and he escorts us around the area.

The bags we are distributing contain basic groceries such as rice, sugar, flower, oil, oatmeal, pasta, canned wieners and canned meat. We also enclose a written meditation and the contact information of the mission post in the bags. The committee decided to use the church members as means to be sure the bags are reaching the people that really need them.

This also allows the church members to speak some applicable words when they hand over the grocery bags. At the same time, this approach also provides a connection to our church in that neighborhood. We hope and pray that the Lord may use these means to bring these people to His marvelous light.

While I'm writing this article, we are preparing the fifth tour to bring new supplies to the different Church members for distribution. The Police officer is willing to help out again. As a thank you for their help we have donated face-masks and disinfection alcohol

bottles to the Police, as support to them during their riskier service to the community due to the Corona Crisis.

It has been a privilege to be enabled to help out in these special times, also taking into account that until this moment we have been spared from the disease. In the meantime, we have seen special dealings in order to fulfill the distribution of the needed help. That it may humble our hearts and also give a true desire to honor the Lord. In these times it

is true more than ever, that they whom has been given to know Him, can rest in His sovereignty. That it might be given to receive that trust in the Lord, that in spite of the circumstances, there may be true peace in Him who created the earth, and who also by His providence keeps "the sheep of His hand", Psalm 95:4-7. Just after the great commission was given, the Lord added: "and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen". That we may experience that nearness, as a denomination, as mission post, but also individually.

“Understandest Thou What Thou Readest?”

I have been working now in the Bookstore in Tarija for a few years. During this time, I have had the opportunity to speak with different men and women of all ages. Sometimes they have been people from other Evangelical Churches. Because our bookstore is also in the area of other book suppliers, we also have people come into the store looking for other books. They are people from the Roman Catholic church, or from other sects. We have even had conversations with atheists. Maybe you are wondering, “What do they ask about?”. Well, many times they have questions about life in general, or sometimes they ask about the existence of God. It’s not that they deny God exists, but there are things that they do not understand. Then, when you have these conversations it is so necessary to be able, *“to speak of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear.”* (1 Peter 3:15)

Sometimes we have people who come into the store, and they would like to speak to the missionaries. We recently had this just before the quarantine in Bolivia. A young man from another town happened to be in Tarija. His elderly father had been admitted to the hospital with dengue (a mosquito borne disease here). His father needed surgery as well, but due to weakness it was being postponed. After telling his story, Mr. Van Brugge said to him, “Do you have any other questions?” He said he did. After a long silence he asked, “Why does God let this happen?” This young man struggled to understand why his father had to suffer so much; he

was a Christian. Many more people struggle with the question “Why”. We explained to the young man that it is better to ask “For what purpose?” Maybe we don’t ask this question out loud, but don’t we also have these questions many times?

When people come to the bookstore from other churches where the truth is not taught, it is a delicate thing to try and instruct them in the truth of God’s Word. People who are suffering come to the store. One young man came into the store and asked that I pray that his life would end. It was difficult to show him the right way, and that in the Lord there is hope. Then I feel the need of the Lord’s help to speak to these people, using the Bible to guide them.

We also have many people who are very happy that we have a bookstore in Tarija where they can purchase good literature. Even ministers from other evangelical churches ask their church members to

buy at our bookstore, because they know they can trust the content of the books we sell in Bolivia. The nice thing of having our bookstore is that it gives an opportunity for us to speak to people. While the people in Bolivia generally do not read so much, yet there seems to be a desire for sound reformed books.

It is important they understand what they read, so we try to speak to each one that we sell books to. They are also invited to attend our church services. May the Lord bless these means to spread the “good seed” in my city of Tarija.

Hello boys and girls,

My name is Hadassah Van Beek. I started Pre-School this year, and live with my family in Loma Alta, Bolivia.

Just like for you, in the past month much has changed in our life due to the corona virus outbreak. On March 23 our little brother Nicolas was born in Santa Cruz, and afterwards we were not able to return to our home in Loma Alta due to the quarantine and lock-down. I miss playing with our dog, Peppa, and being able to see my teacher and friends at school.

Our apartment in Santa Cruz has a big tree in the front yard that has large roots growing down from the branches that I love to swing from. Twice a day we can go outside to play and enjoy the fresh air.

On Wednesdays my dad can walk to the grocery store, which is five blocks away. He takes a suitcase along so he can carry everything back,



as we are not allowed to use our car either! Each person is allowed to go out on a certain day, depending on the last number of their ID card. We are thankful that we can get enough food, and a truck stops in front of our apartment a couple times a week with fresh fruit and vegetables. Red, juicy strawberries are my favorite!
